A Cornucopia of Adventure!!

Kenosha and Racine area schools visited Hawthorn Hollow this fall for an exciting adventure where they discovered Johnny Appleseed's shelter and learned of his lore. They mashed and pressed apples to make apple cider. They learned about the behaviors seeds and nuts and how they can move from one place to another. They planted a forest for future generations. It was a pretty busy two hours for these students, but they weren't finished, yet.

They also learned about the Native Americans that lived in this area and made their very own toy action figures. The students, chaperones, and teachers all had a great time and were treated to apple cider, generously donated by Brightonwoods Orchard.

"Why not drink the cider that the students pressed?"

It's because they didn't have time to press all the apples needed to make enough cider for everyone. A bushel of apples is needed to make about three gallons of apple cider. It's also safer to drink cider that has been pasteurized or UV treated to kill any harmful bacteria that may be present.

BUTTERFLIES:

Monitoring at Hawthorn Hollow by Tori Graham

Tiger Swallowtails are one of the larger butterflies and they were abundant this year at Hawthorn Hollow. Both the yellow and dark forms were here. I also saw Silver-spotted Skippers, Tawny Edge Skippers, **Banded Hairstreaks**, **Eastern-tailed Blues**, Spring Azures, Buckeyes, Great Spangled Fritillaries, Question Marks, and many more.

Recent studies have shown that butterfly populations are declining, even for some species that have been considered common. Data gathered by concerned citizen scientists

can play an important role in supporting conservation efforts. It takes consistency and dedication, but is key to managing our natural areas to protect and preserve our native butterfly species.

I'll be monitoring butterflies again next summer beginning in June and you're welcome to join me! (We are very pleased that Tori chose Hawthorn Hollow to conduct her monitoring.) **Thank you, Tori,** for helping us better understand our butterfly populations!


Butterfly Garden
