## **Hawthorn Hollow Prepares to Eye Up Bats**

...and everyone is invited! This fall Hawthorn Hollow will be building and installing bat houses around the grounds in hopes that the areas' hibernating bats will take up residence in them during the summer of 2013. If they do, Hawthorn Hollow staff will be able to begin participating in the Wisconsin Bat-Roost Monitoring Project.

White-nose Syndrome (WNS), a fungal disease that fatally affects bats during their hibernation season, is getting closer to Wisconsin. This disease has been spreading out from New York State, where it was first discovered in 2006. WNS has been 100% fatal in some hibernacula, with the death toll reaching more than 5.5 million in the U.S.

This is quite alarming since the number of night-flying insects consumed annually by one million bats is equal to almost 700 tons. It's estimated that insect-eating bats provide billions of dollars in savings in annual insect control expenses for the U.S. agricultural industry alone.

Hawthorn Hollow received a Citizen-based Monitoring Partnership Program grant from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources to expand bat monitoring in Southeastern Wisconsin. Short-term monitoring can help provide a baseline for the number and species of bats inhabiting areas. Long-term monitoring can help track the unfortunate decline of bat species as WNS spreads into the area.

One of the first major investments the Hyslop Foundation made in Hawthorn Hollow after it was established in 1967 was to transform what was previously a pasture and hayfield for Ruth Teuscher's horses into a 15 acre Arboretum. They were able to enlist Clarence Godshalk who worked at the Morton Arboretum in Lisle, IL, from its inception in 1922, until he was named Director in 1939, and retired as Director Emeritus in 1966. Unfortunately, only one crude drawing of Godshalk's plan remains today.

Over the years many changes have taken place, not only to our own grounds but within the profession of landscape design. Storms, disease, age, and replacement all made a mark on the aesthetic integrity of the Arboretum, though we have tried to continue the vision of Clarence Godshalk.

Thanks to a generous grant from the Mary Frost Ashley Charitable Trust, Hawthorn Hollow is now beginning to develop a long-term plan for the Arboretum, gardens and Amphitheater. The Plan will help guide us into the future and assure us that we are proceeding in an appropriate and environmentally sustainable direction. We hope to instill the importance of planning to all our visitors by incorporating the highest standards of ecologically sound landscape design and management practices. The plan will be completed by next summer.
